CORE VALUES

Honesty

Honesty is demonstrated over time and in a variety of situations. It is a series of behaviors that the officer has demonstrated over time that has gained the trust of others through establishing himself/herself as straightforward and sincere. This credibility has been developed through the absence of such counter-productive behaviors as: rationalizations, forgetful-ness, and shading the truth. The officer is willing to admit fault and correct mistakes as quickly as possible.

Sense of Urgency

The officer assertively approaches tasks or situations with immediate action. A sense of urgency is demonstrated most obviously by the officer's prompt response to all calls for service. Officers should possess a sense of urgency about completing investigations, conducting follow-ups, returning phone calls, responding to pages, etc. The officer approaches all aspects of the job in an eager manner.

Attention to Detail

Attention to detail is demonstrated by a constant awareness to the myriad of variables that come into play due to the nature of the job. This attention to detail not only serves as a defense mechanism (e.g., recognition of the 10 deadly errors) but also drives the officer to strive for perfection in each task the officer performs. This attention to detail ensures that all tasks are completed correctly the first time; including filling out and completing forms and reports.

Team Oriented

A team-oriented individual realizes that each officer contributes to the group effort; however, it is the collective efforts of the members that assures the overall goals of the Wickliffe Police Department are achieved. The officer works with others as a team member and strives not for individual recognition but for the recognition of the group. Team players demonstrate this value by providing back-up and offering assistance to others without being told or asked.

Professionalism

The officer who exhibits professionalism does so by performing his/her duties in an exemplary manner for others to follow. By possessing this skill and experience, he/she has made a commitment to excellence. Specific traits that the professional officer demonstrates include punctuality, courtesy, polite-ness, compassion, respect for others, and projects a well-groomed and able image.

Adaptability

The adaptable officer can quickly adjust and perform job duties in extreme, unknown, and ever-changing conditions. This officer anticipates change and promptly adapts. Adaptability is characteristic of officers who are able to prioritize and handle many tasks simultaneously through the use of divided attention skills. The officer is able to compromise and follow through to the successful completion of a task.

Self-Discipline

The self-disciplined officer has an internal control system that allows him/her to function independently without constant supervision. This officer is accountable for his/her actions. The focused officer recognizes the job that needs to be done and does it well, regardless of how "unpleasant" it may be. He/she is not unduly influenced by outside factors which may be a detriment to job responsibilities. Self-discipline allows the officer to project the positive image of and respect for the department at all times.

Performance Driven

The officer is driven to work hard as evidenced by the quantity and quality of services provided to the public. The officer strives to stay busy throughout his/her shift; continually looking for ways to support the objectives of the department. The performance driven officer effectively uses traffic enforcement and criminal arrests to save lives and to protect the public.

Officer Safety

The safety conscious officer demonstrates a high level of awareness in every situation. Through this awareness the officer realizes the potential risks associated with the job (e.g., recognition of the 10 deadly errors). He/she is proactive so as to guard himself/herself, as well as others, from potential dangers. He/she is physically fit enabling the officer to meet the demands of the job. Officer safety is predicated on the willingness of an individual to improve his/her skills through training.

Leadership

A leader is someone who consistently exhibits the core values of this organization and is willing to take command of situations, when appropriate. Although leadership is expected of supervisors, every officer can demonstrate leadership by selflessly taking the responsibility to lead in difficult situations. Leadership is also the ability to stand up for what is right, alone if necessary, even when the decision is not "popular".

LETTER OF INTRODUCTION

Police Chief Bush

I respectfully submit this volume of reports and activities transacted by the Wickliffe Police Department for the calendar year 2023.

The statistical reports, graphs, and charts contained in this annual report show the patterns of crime, incidents and other activities responded to by the police department this year. We track a series of 13 categories of serious crimes from year to year to compare crime trends in Wickliffe. When looking at the trends over the last 5 years, 2023 crime has stayed consistent or decreased; however, this year 5 categories experienced an increase from 2022: Rape/Sex was up from 7 to 11 cases, Assaults were up from 24 to 29 cases, Thefts increased from 142 to 181 cases, Vehicle Thefts increased from 18 to 50 and Domestic Violence increased from 51 to 58 cases. Categories which saw a decrease in activity include Weapons which were down 17%, Narcotics which decreased 28%, Burglary/B&E decreased 23%, and Fraud decreased 28%. Murder, Attempted Murder, and Robbery remained steady at zero. The largest increase was theft of vehicles. This has been a national trend due to the ease of which two car manufacturer's vehicle designs allowed their vehicles to be started without keys. This ease of theft was then made worse by the social media platform, TikTok, being used to demonstrate how to steal a car and then teens creating a TikTok challenge to steal the vehicles. Our department contacted both vehicle manufacturers and we were provided steering wheel locks (clubs), that we provided to our residents free of charge if they owned a Hyundai or Kia.

There were a number of significant incidents in 2023 and I will highlight a couple:

- In February, a tragic incident occurred at a residence on Ridgeview. An 18-year-old was making homemade fireworks when he accidentally caused an explosion in his garage. The explosion destroyed the garage, damaged surrounding homes, and tragically killed the young man. Detectives worked with many law enforcement agencies during the lengthy investigation and it was determined to be an accident.
- In June, a patrolman attempted to stop a motorcycle/dirt bike that we had numerous reports of reckless driving in the area of Ridgewick and along Euclid Ave. The driver was observed doing wheelies and weaving in and out of traffic and fled upon the officer attempting to stop him. This pursuit was eventually terminated for safety reasons. The next day another officer again observed the driver doing wheelies down Euclid Ave and driving recklessly. The officer attempted to stop him and he again fled. This pursuit was also eventually called off due to safety concerns when the driver drove the wrong way down a one-way street in Euclid. The driver was observed using his cell phone to videotape officers during these pursuits. Our detectives, searching social media, eventually identified the suspect and he was arrested at his residence on Ridgewick. He was charged with numerous felony fleeing charges and was convicted in Lake County Common Pleas. We are continuing to see the trend of the disrespect of law enforcement with the increase in these refusals to stop when being pulled over. Wickliffe officers were involved in 63 high speed motor vehicle pursuits with the majority of them being terminated due to the increased risk to the officer and the public. Every high-speed pursuit is investigated fully to bring the perpetrator to justice.

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- In August, Officers responded to a Ridgewick condo for a report of a male discharging a handgun into the air and then retreating into the residence. The male refused to come outside when ordered to and a standoff ensued with the Western Lake County ERT responding. After approximately 5 hours the male eventually exited and was taken into custody. The male is currently in federal custody after being charged with federal weapons under disability.

The police department staffing saw significant change in 2023 with the retirement of 5 officers. In January, Det. Dondrea (28 years of service) and Det. Moreland (31 years of service) retired and took positions with the Lake County Narcotics Agency. In March, Patrolman Brenner retired after 31 years of service. Patrolman Shum retired in August after serving for 32 years and finally, after serving the City of Wickliffe for 35 years and leading the department as the Chief of Police for 16 of those years, Chief Randy Ice retired. All of these officers will be greatly missed. These retirements created the need for entry level patrolmen positions and the promotion to Sergeant, to Lieutenant, and Chief of Police. After the promotional process was completed, Det. Cook was promoted to Det. Sergeant and Sgt. Krivacic was promoted to Lieutenant. In October, I took over leading the department as the Chief of Police. Throughout the year we were continually recruiting and interviewing candidates for entry patrolman and we have been fortunate enough to hire 4 officers throughout the year. Patrolman Snyder was hired in January and has since completed his field training and is in solo patrol. Patrolman Ours was hired in February and was sent to the Tri-C Police Academy. He has since completed his field training and is in solo patrol. Patrolman Sieminski was hired in March, completed the field training program, and is currently in solo patrol. The Civil Service Commission decided to try the Lateral Entry process for patrolman and in October Patrolman Dodds, who came from the Eastlake Police Department, was hired. Ptl. Dodds was able to go through an abbreviated field training program and he is currently in solo patrol. We are presently two patrol officers short and are in the process of hiring. In late 2022 we completed fundraising for our K9 program and K9 Bane and his handler Ptl. Merrifield completed their first full year of service as a team. This program could not have been possible without the generous donations numerous people and businesses made, especially Truline Industries and their owner, Court Durkalski, who made a substantial donation.

Funding for the day-to-day operations of the police department is through the cities safety fund which generates money through a voter approved levy and the general fund. Ninety-five percent of the money allocated to the police department from city council supports general operations and about five percent is used for equipment and technology needs of the police department. Financing the equipment needs of the police department is completed through two separate funding mechanisms; the capital improvement fund and the Law Enforcement Trust Fund. This year we purchased one marked Ford SUV police interceptor

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and equipment to fully outfit this vehicle for road patrol. City Council approved the purchase to revamp the camera system throughout the police department, city hall, and in some of the parks. This equipment was ordered; however, due to production delays the project was just started in 2024. Additional items purchased through the capital improvement fund include computer upgrades, detective bureau equipment, and emergency response team equipment. The Law Enforcement Trust Fund was used for purchasing additional fitness equipment for the police department gym as well as training schools.

The Wickliffe Police Department continues to participate in regional teams in Lake and Cuyahoga Counties which provides our department with additional support skills while defraying the cost of these specialized skills. The Western Lake County Emergency Response team (SWAT) consist of police officers from Wickliffe, Willowick, Willoughby, Eastlake, Willoughby Hills, and Kirtland. This team was formed in 1988 with eight officers from Wickliffe and Willowick and now has an active compliment of over twenty officers who train once a month for eight hours. Additionally, the entire ERT participates in two weeks of training in the spring and fall to further solidify their consistent application of tactics needed to safely resolve dangerous situations. The Lake County Crash Reconstruction Team was formed in 2011 by Lieutenant Robert Gonzalez of the Eastlake Police Department to fill the need for more sophisticated accident reconstructions skills to accurately document serious accidents. Wickliffe currently has three officers assigned to the accident reconstruction team who are required to attend all training events and maintain their proficiency in accident reconstruction. Another regional team we participate in is the U.S. Marshals Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force. This team is tasked with finding and arresting fugitives who have warrants for their arrest in the

Chief Ice,

I wanted to take a moment and recognize several officers and a dispatcher for their outstanding teamwork which resulted in the arrest of Dante Jordan. On the evening of 1/15/2023, a resident returned to their home at approx. 2000 hrs and found their house had been burglarized. **Ptl. Bischof**, **Ptl. Didona** and **Ptl. Rosen** investigated the crime and processed the scene. During the investigation, they obtained a detailed description of stolen items from the home and collected several pieces of evidence. One key piece of evidence that was recovered was a shoe print in the snow directly in front of the suspect's point of entry into the home. Upon researching the distinct tread pattern of the shoe, **Ptl. Rosen** was able to identify the exact type shoe that the suspect was wearing at the time of the burglary. **Ptl. Bischof** also spoke with a neighbor and obtained a description of a suspicious vehicle that was parked at the home during the exact time frame that the crime was committed.

At approx. 0432 hrs on 1/16/2023, **Ptl. Bischof** was patrolling the parking lot of a hotel in the city when he located a parked vehicle that was identical to the reported suspicious vehicle that was at the home during the time of the burglary. Upon viewing the interior of the vehicle, the officers observed in plain view some of the items that were reported stolen during the burglary. All of the night shift officers, including **Ptl. Ankuda**, were at the hotel for a lengthy amount of time in attempt to try and locate the suspect. **Disp. Johnson** did extensive research on the vehicle, which was registered to a business, and she was able to identify the owner of the business. Upon searching further, she found that Dante Jordan was the son of the business owner and that he currently had an outstanding arrest warrant for burglary. In addition, it was also learned that the same vehicle was believed to be involved in another recently burglary in a nearby city.

On the following dayshift, **Ptl. Smith** was assisting the detective bureau at the hotel. At approx. 1119 hrs on 1/16/2023, he observed Dante Jordan exit the hotel. Within seconds, a foot chase ensued and **Ptl. Smith** observed Jordan attempt to discard a firearm. **Ptl. Smith** was assisted by several officers, including **Ptl. Peacock**, in catching Jordan and taking him into custody. When Jordan was taken into custody, he was wearing the same distinct shoes that were worn at the time of the burglary. In addition, Jordan was also wearing a coat that was reported stolen during the burglary.

Upon further investigation, officers were able to locate all of the reported stolen items from the burglary. One of the main items that was stolen during the burglary, a video game system, was found in the possession of Jordan's female acquaintance who was with him at the hotel.

The arrest of this burglary suspect less than 24 hours after the crime occurred would not have been possible without all of the officers and dispatcher working together as a team. Each one of the officers and dispatcher did an outstanding job and I commend each of them on their teamwork, dedication and attention to detail.

Ryan and Anthony,

I just got the Judgement Entry of Sentence for Dasean Jenkins, whom the two of you arrested after a traffic stop initiated by Ptl. Bischof for an equipment violation last August. After observing the violation, Ptl. Bischof followed the vehicle and observed some changes in driving behavior indicative of criminal behavior. After the initial stop, you both looked past the basis for the stop and found additional criminal indicators such as an open container of liquor, a cup filled with alcohol, and an odor of marijuana. After learning of an arrest warrant for the driver, Dasean Jenkins, you briefly questioned him about the alcohol and marijuana, giving you the probable cause needed to lengthen the duration of the stop and search the vehicle. Prior to doing so, you removed the passenger, Dasean's mother Tamika Jenkins, and questioned her. In doing so, you learned that there was a firearm in the car that Tamika had initially tried to claim as hers. After completing a search, you located numerous bags of narcotics and a loaded pistol. Instead of stopping there, arresting both and calling it a day, you continued your investigation by Mirandizing both and questioning each further. Because of this, you were able to obtain a confession from Dasean regarding the large amount of narcotics. Dasean and Tamika continued to say that the pistol belonged to her so you decided to bring her to the station to interview further. In doing so, you were able to obtain statements from her that the pistol actually belonged to her son Dasean who is prohibited from possessing a firearm. You also obtained DNA cheek swabs for potential physical evidence linking him to the weapon. Because of all your hard work, Dasean pled guilty by information, meaning he chose to settle the case without even going to the Grand Jury first. He pled to both counts, Possession of Cocaine F1 and Having Weapons Under Disability F3, and received a sentence of 8-12 years in prison.

This whole case started from a simple equipment violation and resulted in a convicted felon in possession of a gun and over 50 grams of cocaine receiving a lengthy prison sentence. Even more so is that there was no legal challenge to anything because of the diligent work you did in making sure all exceptions to the search warrant requirement and Miranda rules were satisfied and from taking the time to interview both occupants several times resulting in confessions.

Great job and keep up the good work!


On behalf of the Willoughby Hills Police Department, I would like to thank you and Officer Nick Merrifield for his quick mutual-aid response on Thursday, July 13, 2023, to assist our officers with a search for a suicidal male on the I-90 exit ramp to SOM Center Road.

Upon arrival, Officer Merrifield assisted by coordinating with Willoughby Hills Police Sergeant Shannon Vachet in setting up a perimeter. Once the subject was located, Officer Merrifield assisted officers in approaching the subject and providing cover. The male was armed with a knife and began stabbing himself in the chest. Moreover, he told officers to shoot him. He was subsequently subdued with an electronic control device and taken into custody with the help of Officer Merrifield. Without his invaluable assistance, this situation could have ended much differently. I have since nominated the officers involved, to include Officer Merrifield, for an award through the Lake County Association of Chiefs of Police.

As a token of our gratitude, I have enclosed a WHPD challenge coin for you to forward to Officer Merrifield. Please extend our sincere thanks to him for coming to our aid during this dangerous situation. His professionalism and cooperation were greatly appreciated. Re: Letter of Recommendation ~ Chief's Association Medal

It is with great pride, I submit Willoughby Hills Police Sergeant Shannon Vachet, Willoughby Hills Police Officer Richard "RJ" Harmon, and Wickliffe Police Officer Nick Merrifield for a Lake County Association of Chiefs of Police Awards Medal for their heroic actions while stopping an armed individual from stabbing himself. Support assistance was provided by Willoughby Hills Police Sergeant Ronald Parmertor.

On Thursday, July 13, 2023, at approximately 2:30 a.m., Willoughby Hills Police Officers responded to responded to the area of the I-90 east bound exit ramp to SOM Center Road. Dispatch received a 911 report that a suicidal male armed with a knife had exited his wife's vehicle, jumped over the guard rail, and ran down the hill into what can be described as a deep bowl with heavy brush and tree cover. Sgt Vachet requested mutual-aid assistance, and Wickliffe Officer Nick Merrifield responded to the scene. Officers set up a perimeter, rescue squad personnel were called to the scene, and a search for the individual began.


A short time later, the male was spotted trying to climb up the hill towards Sergeant Vachet. Sergeant Vachet observed at this time the male had multiple areas of clothing covered in his own blood. He was ordered to drop the knife, but stated he could not do that and was not going to be arrested. He was ordered several more times to stop coming towards officers with the knife, at which time the subject sat down near a bush and turned from officers. Sergeant Vachet steadily communicated with the individual throughout, in an effort to de-escalate the situation and keep the male calm.

The situation quickly turned as the male began to scream and repeatedly stab himself in the chest. At this time, Sergeant Vachet, Officer Harmon and Officer Merrifield closed the distance in an effort to intervene. Sergeant Vachet was armed less-lethal with a Taser while assisting officers covered. He was ordered several times to drop the knife and refused, telling officers to shoot him. The subject then stood up with the knife. Sergeant Vachet successfully deployed the Taser and the male threw the knife away. Officers moved in and took him into custody. He was assisted by all three back up and out of the bowl to the awaiting rescue squad. The male was subsequently transported for medical treatment and a psychological evaluation.

Despite the suspect's erratic and violent behavior, the officers involved not only handled the situation bravely, but treated the individual professionally throughout the contact. This situation may have ended much differently, had it not been for the coordinated efforts of the officers involved in this dangerous call.

The extraordinary manner in which Sergeant Vachet, Officer Harmon, Officer Merrifield, and Sergeant Parmertor performed their duties that morning demonstrates their enduring commitment to serving and protecting our community. Their outstanding efforts bring great credit upon themselves and their respective police departments, and sets a standard of excellence for all law enforcement officers to emulate. Again, I commend them for their heroic actions as I recommend them for a LCACP Medal.

Ref: Coulby Park Vandalism Arrests

Beginning in May of this year, the Coulby Park public restrooms have sustained thousands of dollars in damages as a result of multiple incidents of vandalism, arson, and criminal damaging. In response to these incidents, the Wickliffe Police Department initiated a special detail for officers in plain clothes to patrol the park during the evening and early morning hours in an attempt to catch the subjects responsible for these crimes. Although she did not know it at the time, observations made by Ptl. Meghan Blair while working the detail on June 5, 2023, did prove to be vital in catching the people responsible for these crimes.

On June 5, 2023, Ptl. Meghan Blair worked the plain clothes detail in Coulby Park and observed a gold colored SUV parked in the Coulby Park parking lot. Two male occupants exited the vehicle and entered the restrooms. A short time later, the males exited the restrooms and Ptl. Blair checked but found no damage or evidence of criminal activity. On June 6, 2023 while working an overtime shift on patrol, Ptl. Blair observed the same gold SUV in the Coulby Park parking lot just prior to another report of damage and a fire that had been started in the park. Witnesses who contacted the WPD to report this incident advised that the SUV that Ptl. Blair had observed was seen leaving the park after the fire was started.

On July 14, 2023 Ptl. Blair was on patrol and observed the same gold colored SUV that she had observed on the dates mentioned above. Based on her prior observations of this vehicle, Ptl. Blair and Ptl. Smith initiated a traffic stop with the vehicle to investigate. As a result of Ptl. Blair's observations and interviews performed by Ptl. Smith and Detective Cook with the two male occupants of the vehicle, both males admitted to being responsible for every incident and causing all of the damages to the park restrooms and other city owned property. Both males were arrested on felony charges.

Ptl. Blair's attention to detail and exceptional ability to retain and recall details from prior incidents exemplified her performance driven mindset and work ethic. When these incidents were being investigated, Ptl. Smith also showed to be performance driven with a sense of urgency while spending several hours obtaining video evidence and patrolling residential streets looking for the suspect's vehicle. Detective Cook showed adaptability, a sense of urgency, and a team-oriented approach when he delayed his work for the day of this arrest to focus on solving these crimes. Detective Cook's and Ptl. Smith's investigative and interview tactics also played a key role in solving this case. Ptl. Blair, Ptl. Smith, and Detective Cook were team-oriented in their approach to locate the suspects, obtain confessions, and bring justice to those responsible for these crimes.

I commend all of these officers for their efforts and professionalism in their relentless efforts to solve this ongoing investigation. They all exemplified the mission and core values of this department and I am honored to highlight their excellent police work.

I would like to commend Officer Smith and Officer Blair along with Detective Cook on their recent arrest of the two individuals responsible for multiple acts of vandalism at Coulby Park.

Beginning in May of this year and continuing into July, numerous acts of vandalism occurred at the public restrooms, gazebo, and baseball diamonds of Coulby Park. This vandalism caused the overnight closing of the bathrooms and thousands of dollars in damage.


Officer Smith took the initiative to seek out cameras which may have recorded the incident and was successful in obtaining numerous recordings of the individuals and a suspect vehicle. Officer Blair also recognized a suspicious vehicle which had been at the park just prior to one of these vandalism incidents.

On Friday July 14th, Officer Blair observed this same vehicle leaving the park and took the initiative to relay this information to other officers prior to traffic stopping it and beginning an investigation. Officer Smith heard this and assisted Officer Blair at the stop. Despite being lied to initially, Officer Blair and Officer Smith persisted in their interviews and were eventually able to obtain admissions of guilt from the two occupants regarding the vandalism.


The two individuals were conveyed to the police department where they were further interviewed by Detective Cook. During these interviews, both individuals confessed to Detective Cook and Officer Smith to all of the incidents including several acts of arson.

Without the persistence of Officer Smith's follow up, the keen observations and self-initiated activity of Officer Blair, and the interview and interrogation ability of Detective Cook, I believe these repeated acts of vandalism may not have been solved. I commend each of these officers for their actions along with their willingness to work together to achieve the result of numerous felony charges and those responsible for damaging city property being brought to justice.



DETECTIVE BUREAU REPORT

Detective Lieutenant Coolick

The Wickliffe Police Department detective bureau is the criminal investigation division of the department and is responsible for follow-up investigations of felonies and certain misdemeanors. Detectives are scheduled Monday through Friday and are considered on-call at all other times. Some facets of the detective bureau are review and follow up investigations, preparing cases for court, grand jury preparation and testimony, intelligence gathering, evidence collection/crime scene processing, witness and suspect interviews, preparing investigative subpoenas and search warrants, drug investigations, forfeiture proceedings, and assisting in fingerprinting residents.

I was assigned as the officer-in-charge of the detective bureau in May of 2022. The detective bureau is normally comprised of a supervisor and three detectives as well as a property officer and detective bureau secretary. 2023 saw some changes in the bureau due to the retirement of two long-standing detectives at the beginning of the year. Due to the shortage in manpower from other retirements in the agency, the two detective spots were not immediately filled. Luckily, in July of this year we were afforded the opportunity to assign one officer to the detective bureau to fill one of the open spots. After a thorough interview and selection process was completed by numerous well qualified officers, Ptl. Fitch was selected for the open detective position. Det. Fitch hit the ground running in her new role and has been doing a great job. 2023 also saw some other changes in the bureau with the promotion of Det. Cook to the rank of sergeant. Congratulations Detective Sergeant Cook and Detective Fitch!

Also assigned to the detective bureau is Ptl. Valko who is the property officer and assists the bureau with the extensive amount of evidence and property management. Disp. Hirz and Sec. Miklus shared the responsibilities of the detective bureau secretary which include handling fingerprint and BCI files, managing and retaining media files such as dashcam and body-worn camera video, and preparing case files to assist in the prosecution of police department cases at both the municipal court and county common pleas court level. Disp. Hirz retired at the end of this year and we wish her the best in her retirement and thank her for her 26 years of service to the city of Wickliffe.

In 2023, the WPD detective bureau was involved in the investigation of over 110 criminal cases. The types of crimes investigated ranged from shootings, robbery, sexual assault, burglary, and drug trafficking as well as property crimes such as theft, fraud, and forgery. 90 of these cases were cleared either by arrest or by exceptional means, with a clearance rate of 80% which is well above the national average.

Some noteworthy cases worked on by the detective bureau in 2023 include:

- On January 15th, patrol officers took a report of a residential burglary which occurred on Shaker Dr. The victim of this incident reported numerous items missing from his home including a PlayStation 5 gaming console. An alert neighbor reported to officers on scene that he had observed a suspicious vehicle in the area at the time of the burglary. Later that evening, an alert officer observed a vehicle matching that description at a nearby hotel and identified a potential suspect. Detectives responded to the hotel and arranged for surveillance of the vehicle in the lot. Video from the




Detectives match the suspect's shoes to the shoeprints recovered at the residential burglary on Shaker Drive

hotel was reviewed and the suspect was observed, along with an unknown female, carrying some of the stolen items. While still reviewing video, the suspect emerged and began walking to the vehicle. He was confronted by an officer and fled on foot. WPD officers and detectives gave chase and the male was ultimately captured after grabbing a firearm from his waistband and throwing it. The unknown female was also found in the hotel by detectives and was in possession of the stolen gaming console. After impounding the vehicle, detectives prepared a search warrant and were able to locate most of the stolen property inside. Detectives also found the shoes the male was wearing matched shoeprints recovered at the burglary scene. The male was interviewed by detectives who eventually admitted his involvement in the burglary. He was charged with numerous felonies and later pled guilty and was sentenced to prison.

- On January 31st, an alert detective observed a suspicious vehicle in the parking lot of a hotel. While checking on the vehicle, it was found to be entered stolen with the Eastlake Police Dept. While investigating, a suspicious male was spotted looking from a window toward the stolen car. That male denied knowledge of the vehicle and later left the hotel on foot. After impounding the vehicle, detectives reviewed video from the hotel and observed that same male parking the car earlier in the day. The male was later identified and his hotel room was searched. While doing so, numerous stolen items were found from multiple thefts and B&E's from nearby cities. Warrants were obtained for the male who was later arrested and interviewed by detectives who admitted to the thefts and stealing the car. The male later pled guilty to numerous felonies and was sentenced to prison.
- On April 23rd, detectives were notified of a shooting which occurred at a hotel and seven individuals had been detained by patrol officers as part of the investigation. Detectives began interviewing all involved persons and were able to obtain permission to search the room where the shooting occurred. While doing so, detectives noted 43 items of evidence to include 15 shell casings, bullet fragments, bullet holes, ammunition and a handgun which was found underneath the bed. After processing the crime scene and collecting evidence, detectives returned to the police station and continued interviewing the detained individuals.



The suspected shooter was identified and detectives spoke with him at length, who eventually admitted to the shooting. DNA evidence and gunshot residue evidence was collected and analyzed at the crime lab. The male was ultimately charged with several felonies, later pled guilty and was sentenced to prison.

- Some other items of note include a vandalism incident in June occurring at Our Lady of Mt Carmel Church in which a male had destroyed an outdoor Stations of the Cross display. While investigating the incident, detectives identified a possible suspect who was interviewed and admitted to the vandalism. The male was arrested and his case is pending trial. In July, a residential burglary of a home on E. 296th St was reported in which detectives were able to identify the suspect and obtain a warrant for his arrest. Also occurring in July were several reported acts of vandalism at Coulby Park. Detectives assisted patrol officers with this investigation which resulted in the arrest of two adults who were charged with several felonies and both later pled guilty. In October, detectives followed up on information received that a juvenile had stolen a firearm from an unlocked vehicle. A lengthy investigation was conducted which resulted in the recovery of the stolen gun and recommended criminal charges being sent to the juvenile court.

In addition to the above, detectives investigated other burglaries, assaults, sexual assaults, and felony thefts. Throughout the year, detectives routinely followed up on cases in which an individual failed to stop for patrol officers attempting a traffic stop which led to a brief vehicle pursuit. Detectives were able to make several arrests in these cases in the following days. The continued use of license plate reading cameras acquired by the city last year was a significant help in these types of cases and as well as many other criminal investigations.

In closing, I would like to thank Detective Sergeant Cook, Detective Fitch, Ptl. Valko, Secretary Miklus, and Dispatcher Hirz for their thoroughness, dedication, and continued diligent work in the detective bureau; Chiefs Ice and Bush for their support and leadership; and lastly Mayor Sakacs and the Wickliffe City Council for their continued support of the members of the detective bureau.

JAIL REPORT



The Wickliffe City Jail is a twelve-day facility that consists of eight jail cells. Four of these cells are designated for male prisoners and two cells are designated for female prisoners. Two cells are designated for those prisoners who are under the influence of alcohol or narcotics, suicidal, security risks, or require an increase in surveillance. The jail does not hold arrested juveniles.

During 2023, the jail held 417 prisoners who were held on bond, waiting for arraignment or court appearances, or serving court ordered sentences. 150 of the prisoners were held on various felony charges and 267 prisoners were held on misdemeanor charges. Prisoners spent an average of 12.29 hours in the jail and the average daily population of the jail was 1.14 prisoners. 291 males and 126 females were housed in the jail during this period. The jail was inspected by the Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections.

Per Wickliffe Police Policy, a jail officer is responsible for checking on the welfare of each prisoner every hour and provides for their needs. Prisoners are fed three times per day and can receive snacks between meals. Meals are purchased by US Foodservice, a provider of meals to other jail institutions and hospitals, and BJ Wholesale Club. Meals are prepared in the jail kitchen, which was renovated in 2022.

A video arraignment system is in place whereby prisoners “appear” before a Willoughby Court Judge from the jail office via a computerized teleconferencing system. A confinement expense reimbursement program has been instituted. Those prisoners who are able to pay can be ordered by the court to pay up to \$65.00 per day for their stay in the Wickliffe city jail. In 2023, Wickliffe received \$814.79 in jail confinement reimbursement fees collected by the Willoughby Municipal Court.



NALOXONE REPORT

In 2017, in response to the overwhelming opiate addiction epidemic and overdose deaths, recently retired Chief Ice agreed to purchase Naloxone, commonly referred to as Narcan, for officers to use in combating opiate overdoses. When administered to persons overdosing on opiates, Narcan has the ability to counter the effects of the opiate. The City of Wickliffe and the Lake County Department of General Health District provided officers with the Narcan. After receiving training in the use of Narcan, officers began carrying it in their patrol cars. In 2023, Narcan was used 11 times by officers in an effort to save lives. The following officers administered Narcan to overdosing persons: Sgt. Sopko (2), Ptl. Rosen (2), Ptl. Paull (2), Ptl. Bischof (2), Ptl. Pecnik (1), Ptl. Blair (1), and Ptl. Sieminski (1).

INTOXILYZER 8000*Patrolman Rosen*

In 2023, fifty-three (53) persons were arrested for an OVI offense. Of these, fifty (50) were suspected of being under the influence of alcohol and two (2) were suspected of being under the influence of a drug of abuse and one (1) was suspected of being under the influence of alcohol and a drug of abuse.

Drugs that were suspected due to either admission of the driver or presence of evidence suggesting specific drug usage included the following:


- Heroin: 1
- PCP: 2 (additionally, marijuana was also suspected in both instances)

For drivers believed to be under the influence of alcohol, a breath test is usually requested. If the driver is transported to the hospital for possible injuries, then a blood and/or urine sample is requested. If a driver is suspected of being under the influence of drugs, then a blood sample is requested. Under Ohio Law, drivers can refuse to submit a sample under most circumstances, although they may face a more severe sentence at Court. In 2023, of all OVI arrests, twenty-six (26) drivers submitted a breath, blood or urine sample and twenty-seven (27) refused for a refusal rate of 51%.

The average breath alcohol content (BAC) from all drivers who submitted a sample was .181. The range of BAC was from .126 to .260. The average age of all OVI offenders was 41.

The breakdown of measured BAC from the drivers who submitted a breath sample are:






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ACCIDENTS BY TIME OF DAY

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER REPORT

Patrolman Smith

In 2023, the Wickliffe Police Department continued its coordination efforts with the Lake County Juvenile Court, Prosecutor's Office, and the Wickliffe City Schools. The School Resource Officer (SRO) handled numerous types of calls for service ranging from assaults, harassments, mental health, alcohol and drug usage to theft.

The SRO program is best summed as follows: if the courts, schools and police form a triangle, then the SRO is at the center of the triangle. The SRO's purpose is to facilitate communication between these three groups. The following are some examples of how the relationship benefits all three organizations in the triangle. If an administrative investigation reveals criminal activity in the school, that principal contacts the SRO. The SRO can then access police resources to conduct the investigation. The SRO knows the standard conduct required to prosecute a juvenile criminally and can advise the principal if such conditions are met. Another example is if an investigation starts off of school grounds, it may lead to the discovery of inappropriate activity that had occurred in the school. In some instances, school administrators are better equipped to handle such problems that do not require police action.

This current school year has been a big change for the community. The Wickliffe School District built a brand-new school, which holds all grades from preschool to 12th grade and was opened in the fall of 2023. All students and staff are now held in one large building, which is now the Campus of Wickliffe. The SRO's presence in the school serves as a deterrent to crime and as a resource to students and staff for non-criminal issues. The SRO has the ability to interact with students in ways that an officer might not have been able to do as part of their daily patrol activities.

Wickliffe officers and the Campus of Wickliffe continued to work together and hold events for the students and children of the community. The SRO and Community Policing Office once again participated in Trunk-or-Treat during Halloween where they interacted with the children and the community while passing out candy. Wickliffe officers also continued the Shop-with-a-Cop program where selected students from the Campus of Wickliffe were chosen to go to Target with Wickliffe Police officers to shop for gifts for their families for Christmas. The children enjoyed themselves and it was a great success. In the Spring of 2023, the Wickliffe P.D. and Wickliffe F.D. held their first Police vs Fire basketball game for the closing ceremonies of the Wickliffe Schools. It was a great event for the community to watch and interact with their first responders.

The men and women of the Wickliffe Police Department would like to show their appreciation to Chief Ice and Chief Bush, Mayor Sakacs, City Council and the school's administrators, teachers, staff and students.

to locate criminal activity, but is also a more approachable form of patrol, enhancing a more personal and casual relationship between the community and the police department. In 2023, bike patrol officers assisted with ceremonies, parades, The FEST, the annual Wickliffe Police Bike Rodeo, and offered a higher police presence during Halloween Trick-or-Treating.

Special thanks to retired Chief Ice, current Chief Bush, the bicycle officers who rode during 2023, Mayor Sakacs, and City Council for their continued support to this program.

The Wickliffe Police Department Bicycle Patrol Unit consists of specially trained officers in urban mountain bicycle patrol. In 2022, Patrolman Heaton was added to the WPD Bike Patrol Unit. Two new officers, Ptl. Ankuda and Ptl. Peacock were added to the WPD Bike Patrol Unit in 2023. The bicycle patrol assignment is an additional duty for patrol personnel. Each bicycle patrol officer attends a 40-hour training class and is IPMBA (International Police Mountain Bike Association) certified. Officers are trained in riding bicycles over rough terrain, including on stairways, steep inclines, in confined spaces, at night, and under adverse weather conditions. Officers are adept at riding in crowds at special events and maneuvering at very slow speeds. Officers also practice quick dismounting techniques, which are necessary when overtaking someone fleeing from police, and then making an apprehension. In 2022, the WPD Bike Patrol bicycles were outfitted with new headlights, taillights, emergency lights, and sirens.

The Bicycle Patrol Unit provides a more proactive approach in utilizing officers for specialized patrol in problem areas of the city for crime prevention, detection, and enforcement. In addition, the bike patrol officers provide additional public relations with residents in city parks, neighborhoods, and businesses throughout the city. The Bike Patrol Unit offers a more covert form of patrol, enhancing a more personal and casual relationship between the community and the police department.

CANINE UNIT

K9 Bane celebrated his first full year with the Wickliffe Police Department in November 2023. He is a 3-year-old Belgian Malinois, born in the Slovak Republic, and is trained in narcotic odors as well as patrol tactics, which include human or article search, tracking and suspect apprehension. As his handler, it is my responsibility to continue his ongoing training, to control him on his deployments during working hours, and to care for him when he is off duty.

Throughout the last year, Bane has been utilized not only by our police agency, but by our neighboring agencies as well. Throughout 2023, Bane logged a total of 75 deployments which included vehicle sniffs for narcotics and patrol work. Bane was responsible for the arrest of a total of 20 suspects throughout his deployments. Some of Bane's notable deployments were as follows:

- On January 16th of 2023, Bane and I responded to the area of Dollar General on Euclid Ave for a report of a male and female who had shoplifted from the store. Officers arrived on scene and took the female into custody, but the male was reported to have fled on foot. The male was observed running south through the previous Wickliffe Middle School football field, but quickly ran out of view. I brought Bane to the nearest backyard where I saw the male and began tracking him across the field. Bane led me to a fenced area that had a small ladder propped against it. Based on Bane's alert, I called for other officers to check the adjacent fenced-in yards where the male was then located. He was taken into custody, and it was discovered that the male had an active felony homicide warrant with a nearby County.
- On April 29th, 2023, Bane and I were called to assist Euclid PD with a report of an aggravated robbery and the armed suspect had fled into the woods behind the Lakeland Towers. Euclid PD officers set up a perimeter around the woods and waited for us to arrive to attempt to track the suspect. Upon our arrival, Bane and I tracked the suspect for over 300 yards before I observed him showing a high interest in a large tree at the top of a hill. As we approached the tree, I observed a foot move from behind the tree and immediately started to give commands. I advised the suspect I would release Bane if he did not surrender, and the male quickly stepped from behind the tree and laid down to be taken into custody. During this deployment I realized that Bane is not only valuable in locating suspects, but he is also extremely valuable in having a suspect surrender without the need for officers to approach or use force, leading to a safer outcome for all officers involved.

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- On October 14th, 2023, Bane and I were called to assist a Wickliffe officer during a traffic stop. Bane was deployed for a free air sniff around the vehicle and indicated to the presence of narcotics. This indication led to the arrest of both the driver and passenger for the possession of narcotics and drug paraphernalia.
- On November 15th, 2023, Bane and I were called to assist Willoughby PD on a traffic stop with a vehicle that was observed leaving a residence which was being monitored in a narcotics investigation. Upon our arrival, Bane was deployed for a free air sniff around the vehicle and indicated to the presence of narcotics. During a search of the vehicle, multiple scales with white powder residue were located as well as a loaded handgun. It was later learned that the passenger had concealed 10grams of cocaine on his person and attempted to dispose of the items at the Willoughby PD jail.

Bane has shown that the use of a police K9 for the City of Wickliffe has been instrumental in multiple arrests that would otherwise not have been possible.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE TEAM

Detective Sergeant Cook



The Wickliffe Police Department is a participating member of the Western Lake County Emergency Response Team (ERT). This regional SWAT team is currently comprised of 18 police officers representing six different agencies. The assigned officers are volunteers who perform the duties of the team in addition to their regular assignments. The ERT provides services to approximately 86,000 residents in the cities of Wickliffe, Willowick, Willoughby, Willoughby Hills, Eastlake, Kirtland, Waite Hill, Timberlake, and Lakeline.

The primary duty of the team is providing timely and appropriate responses to high risk and volatile situations that require the specialized training, equipment, capabilities and experience of the team. Team members train monthly as well as an additional week of specialized training in close-quarter tactics and high-risk operations such as warrant services, barricaded subjects and hostage rescue.

discharged a firearm outside of his home and proceeded to barricade himself inside. ERT members responded and after several hours, the male was taken into custody without incident. Another incident occurred in the city of Mentor and the Western Lake County ERT was deployed to assist Mentor PD with an active shooter at a trailer park in their city. Three of the remaining incidents involved the service of high-risk search warrants. These warrants were all completed at the request of the investigating agency and involved the illegal trafficking of drugs at the target location. The use of the ERT in these circumstances is based on a higher threat level as determined by various factors such as a history of violence, known weapons present, prior criminal history, etc. Each of these incidents were resolved tactically and without injury to anyone involved.

In closing, I would like to thank Mayor Sakacs, the Wickliffe City Council, and Chief Ice and Chief Bush for their continued support which allows members of the ERT to provide the residents of western Lake County with the best possible tactical services.

In 2023 Wickliffe PD officers Det. Lt. Coolick and Sgt. Kuhse retired from the team after a combined 24 years of service. Currently representing the City of Wickliffe on the team are Det. Sgt. Cook, Ptl. Paull, and Ptl. Heaton. In addition to the tactical component of the team, there are several police negotiators who are specially trained officers in providing peaceful resolutions to high stress and dangerous situations. Representing the City of Wickliffe as negotiators are Lt. McCaffery, Sgt. Sopko, Sgt. Peeples, Det. Fitch and Ptl. DiDona.

The ERT was utilized six times in 2023. The first incident involved a nighttime callout for an intoxicated male who had been involved in a domestic violence incident and was barricaded inside of his home with several firearms and his 6-year-old son. A second incident occurred in Wickliffe when a male

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U.S. MARSHAL'S NORTHERN OHIO VIOLENT FUGITIVE TASK FORCE

I have been assigned to the Painesville division of the task force since May of 2022.

The purpose of this task force is to apprehend violent fugitives, suspects with felony warrants, and suspects with violent/serious misdemeanor warrants that originate from Lake, Geauga, or Ashtabula County. The task force can also be called out for serious incidents that require the expeditious apprehension of the suspect(s) involved.

In 2023, the task force made numerous arrests in which the suspects were wanted for a variety of violent crimes, including homicide, felonious assault, rape, and drug trafficking. Many of these offenses originated within the City of Wickliffe or its surrounding agencies.

I would like to thank Mayor Sakacs, Wickliffe City Council, Chief Ice and Chief Bush for their support of this task force.

The 2023 U.S. Marshal's Northern Ohio Violent Fugitive Task Force was led by Deputy U.S. Marshal Erica Strnad. The task force is comprised of Deputy U.S. Marshals, Ohio Adult Parole officers, and various officers from police departments throughout Lake, Geauga, and Ashtabula Counties.

The motto of the community policing program for 2023 was "The police are the public and the public are the police." This is a quote by Sir Robert Peel who is widely known as the father of modern policing and whose core principles are still taught around the world today. This year we focused our attention on crime prevention as well as community outreach. I had the opportunity to attend a crime prevention conference which concentrated on observing and understanding crime trends to effect proper proactive measures. Moving forward, the Wickliffe Police Department will prioritize location/opportunity as a means to achieve the desired result which is to minimize risk to our residents. We intend to educate the public of preventive steps necessary to reduce/prevent the opportunity of a potential

At our first blockwatch meeting, James Cain, Chairperson for the City of Wickliffe Civil Service Commission, spoke at length in regards to his duties as a chairperson as well as the functions of the Civil Service Commission. Residents were interested in the recent changes to the Civil Service Commission as it related to lateral transfers to the police department. At that same meeting, Officer Merrifield led a presentation with his partner, K9 Bane. Officer Merrifield was happy to show off Bane's skills in the field in regards to search and seizure. Couchland Coffee hosted our *Coffee with a Cop* meet-and-greet this year. Attendees spoke with several officers who fielded questions from

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basic measures to prevent crime to the main topic of discussion which was Ohio Issue 2 (marijuana legalization initiative).

In the warmer months, the program focuses on a more active approach to community relations. We have several functions which focus on children's safety. Officers attend summer camps and safety towns along with hosting the Bike Rodeo and Dive-In movies nights. In these interactions, officers discuss safety with the youth in our community. Topics of discussion include; stranger danger, situational awareness, calling 911 in an emergency, bicycle safety, pool safety and a general explanation of the roles of a police officer. These events are a major focus of the community policing program and some of the more fun and lighthearted interactions we get to have. As much fun as the kids get to have, the officers who volunteer their time are just as excited to connect with the attendees.

enjoyed pizza, salad, sub sandwiches and Biggy Coffee as they sat and listened to our presenters. Officer Smith, SRO for Wickliffe City Schools, and Leah Reese, Service Coordinator for the Family Resource Center of Wickliffe, provided information for their respective positions. Residents in attendance also received a handout with a comprehensive list of common scams.

This program is a vital resource for the community as well as the police department. As much as the residents in this community need the police department, we rely on them as well. We will continue to strive to maintain a relationship with our residents as well as the surrounding communities in an effort to educate and build a partnership. Throughout the year of 2023, many residents and businesses volunteered and donated to the many events and presentations we are affiliated with and we appreciate your contributions.

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TRAINING

Lieutenant McCaffery

In 2023 the Wickliffe Police Department continued to focus on training its officers and dispatchers so they provide the most professional and capable services possible to the community. The Patrol Division completes a core of courses essential to the patrol function. This core includes: The Reid Technique of Interview and Interrogation; Emergency Vehicle Pursuit and Response Training; Street Survival; Firearms, Arrest, and Survival Tactics (F.A.S.T.); Radar/Laser Certification; Criminal Patrol/Drug Interdiction; and Counter Ambush Tactics for Law Enforcement. Additionally, Officers are encouraged to find elective training courses based on department needs and officer specialization.

Within the communications division, we maintain a core of updated training and techniques essential to the dispatching function. It includes: Law Enforcement Dispatch, Fire Service Dispatch, Emergency Medical Dispatch, Hazardous Materials Response, Suicide Intervention, Domestic Violence Intervention, and 9-1-1 Liability. We have incorporated computer-based training for biennial re-certifications in Law Enforcement, Fire Service, and Emergency Medical dispatch. This has proven to be cost-effective and less disruptive to manpower scheduling, while still providing the most up to-date training material available.

The Continuing Professional Training (CPT) requirement, established by the Ohio Peace Officer Training Council and the Ohio General Assembly, requires all full-time and part-time police officers to complete a set number of hours of annual professional training. This year the state of Ohio mandated that officers attend 24 hours of courses of which 2 hours are for school violence, 3 hours of search and seizure law and 3 hours of legal updates were mandatory. The remaining mandated hours were in verbal judo, de-escalation techniques, officer wellness, criminal patrol, ethics and leadership. The average number of hours of training that members of the Wickliffe Police Department attended; to include all officers, dispatchers and support staff, in 2023 was 65 hours.

Other training highlights for the 2023 year include: Det Sgt. Cook, Det. Fitch and Ptl. Budzicki attending Physical Surveillance Training; K9 Officer Merrifield attending courses on K9 Case Law and High Threat K9 Patrol Tactics; SRO Smith attending the Ohio Police Juvenile Association Conference; Ptl. Ankuda and Ptl. Peacock completing the IPMBA Basic Police Cyclist Course; Ptl. Paull and Ptl. Heaton were assigned to the Western Lake County ERT and attended SWAT1 course; Ptl. Pecnik became an armorer after attending the Remington, Glock and AR15 Armorer courses; Ptl. Ankuda and Ptl. Heaton became FTO's after attending the FTO Instructor School; Ptl. Heaton completed the Advanced Driving Instructor Course; Ptl. Bischoff completing the week long Gracie Jui-jitsu Survival Tactics Instructor's Course; Det. Fitch attending the Certified Voice Stress Analyzer Examiner's Course and Chief Bush attending the FBI LEEDA Executive Leadership Institutes Course. Sgt. Kuhse completed a First Line Supervisor Training Course and Sgt. Peeples completed Police Executive Administrative Leadership School over a 3 week period. Chief Ice attended the Ohio Association of Chief's of Police Conference; Chief Bush attended the FBI NAA Training Conference; and Sgt. Sopko, Sgt. Peeples and Ptl. Didona attended the Midwest Negotiator's Conference. Due to their diligent work ethic, Det. Fitch and Ptl. Peacock were picked to attend the week long Street Cop Conference in Nashville, TN by supervisors of the WPD.

During 2023, 29 full-time police officers, 3 part-time officers, and 8 full-time dispatchers, along with 2 administrative assistants attended training schools or seminars to update or enhance their skills and knowledge in various disciplines. During 2023, officers and staff attended these schools and seminars totaling two thousand eight hundred and fifteen (2,815) hours of continuing education.
