### **Administrators**

#### **A. Police Chief (Bush) Written Report Submitted**

Chief Bush noted he had nothing to add to his written report.

There were no questions or comments for the Police Chief.

#### **B. Fire Chief (Grossman) Written Report Submitted**

Chief Grossman stated he had nothing to add to his written report.

There were no questions or comments for the Fire Chief.

#### **C. Finance Director (Hunter) Written Report Submitted**

Finance Director Hunter noted the month is closed and the current General Fund Carry Over Balance is approximately \$8.3 million. She noted the Temporary Budget packets were distributed to all this evening. Lastly, she thanked Darice for her twenty-one years of service. She noted she was a very dedicated employee. She noted Darice, and her interesting sense of humor, will be missed.

Council President Levon asked if Ms. Hunter was ready to discuss the Temporary Budget / could he call a meeting for next week, and Ms. Hunter noted she is ready, and yes, he could call a meeting next Monday.

Councilperson Jaworski inquired regarding Ms. Hunter's prediction for the remainder of the year. Ms. Hunter noted it is early, but her projection, which she asked not to be held to, would be approximately \$7.5 million.

There were no additional questions or comments for the Finance Director.

**D. Engineer (Formica) Written Report Submitted**

Engineer Formica noted he had nothing to add to his written report.

Councilperson Gerhardstein inquired if East 290<sup>th</sup>, between Rt. 84 and Euclid Avenue is on the suggestions for 2025 Road projects. Mr. Formica noted he would have to check, but that road is in need of attention. Mr. Gerhardstein noted he spoke with the Service Director and some stretches of this road are "pretty bad", as well as Lincoln and Rockefeller, adding that he doesn't want to make changes until the new development goes in.

Councilperson Bala asked why, when we redo a black-top/asphalt street, we do not tar-up the center, as this portion is usually the first to crack. Mr. Formica noted he could talk on this topic for hours, but basically, the tar layer is underneath the top layer and this causes the tar to be drawn up. He noted we have done this on many of our asphalt streets over the last few years.

Councilperson Gerhardstein inquired regarding the lights to be replaced on new streets and wondered if there was an update on this. Service Director Strauser noted they are waiting on numbers – they just received the invoice for last year's road project updates. Once this is paid, they should begin the lights on Rockefeller, Dennis, and Stanford.

There were no additional questions or comments for the Engineer.

**E. Service Director (Strauser) Written Report Submitted**

Service Director Strauser noted he attended a meeting with the City of Euclid regarding sewer rates. He noted Euclid proposed to increase the rates again by 14.5% in 2025 and 7% in 2026. They are trying to stay ahead since they will need to replace filter membranes in 2030. These filters have a ten-year life expectancy and cost approximately \$30 million. Both he and Willowick Mayor Vanni urged Euclid to consider the increases over the past few years. Euclid came back with a three-year plan whereby rates will increase by 8.9% in 2025, 9% in 2026, and 9.3% in 2027. He noted this is favorable as we will know the rates for the next few years. He thanked them for their consideration.

With regard to his upcoming retirement, Dave [Krofcheck] and Laura [Veri] have done a great job. He is confident that Dave will do a great job as Service Director; he is a great guy and has really stepped-up. He noted it should make the change much easier.

Councilperson Gerhardstein asked if the department was actively looking to fill vacancies. Mr. Strauser noted only be Dave's position will be vacant. He noted that the [Assistant Service Director] position, if filled by a qualified current employee, will then open up a position [as a laborer]. Mr. Gerhardstein asked if the Service Department is short-handed. Mr. Strauser noted he could always use more guys, but he is happy with the current number [20] and what they have been able to accomplish with a much smaller group than many years ago.

Councilperson Jaworski asked if Mr. Strauser was concerned regarding negative effects to snow removal. Mr. Strauser noted not unless a new employee does not have the necessary CDL (Commercial Driver's License).

There were no further questions or comments for the Service Director.

**F. Building Commissioner (Sack) Written Report Submitted**

Building Commissioner Sack reported Mr. Hunley of Sunset Development has attained all the necessary paperwork and is awaiting financing details. The development (digging) should begin in about four to five weeks.

Councilperson Gerhardstein inquired regarding the progress on the house on Robert Street where the fire occurred, adding that he continues to get complaints from the neighbors. Mr. Sack noted the grounds are ok, they are waiting for the new siding to be put on the garage. Mr. Sack noted we still have a substantial deposit from them that they have not yet refunded. Mr. Gerhardstein asked the Building Department to do another check as he is hearing there is quite a mess behind the garage. Mr. Sack noted they will take care of it.

There were no additional questions or comments for the Building Commissioner.

**G. Recreation Director (Stopp) Written Report Submitted**

Recreation Director stated he had nothing to add to his written report.

Councilperson Koski inquired regarding the Halloween Party. Mr. Stopp noted they will be participating with the Trunk or Treat to be held on the school grounds. He noted the date is Wednesday, October 23<sup>rd</sup>. He did not recall the time, but anyone could check the school website for time.

Councilperson Gerhardstein asked when the dredging project is expected to begin again at the Golf Course. Engineer Formica noted he left a long message for the contractor last week but has not heard back. He noted he should have an idea by the next meeting.

There were no further questions or comments for the Recreation Director.

### **Audience Participation**

Council President Levon opened Audience Participation to those in attendance at 7:21 PM.

He noted this portion of the meeting is intended for the audience to address the Council and Mayor, not the directors. Anyone wishing to address Council should use the microphone as the meetings are being streamed on YouTube; they must be acknowledged and give their name and address for the clerk's record and will be given a five-minute maximum for their comments.

Mary Acton of 30201 Regent Road congratulated Mr. Strauser on his upcoming retirement, stressing he will be missed. She noted she watches the meetings on YouTube. She noted she worked for a major hospital and was in meetings with hundreds of people. She noted, in reference to past Council Meetings, the snickering and laughing while a constituent is talking is uncalled for. She added the Council President should pay attention to this and call it to order.

After multiple calls inquiring if anyone would like to address Wickliffe City Council and there being no reply, Council President Levon closed Audience Participation at 7:23PM.

He noted the business will be housing items sold at auction online for purchasers to pick up their items.

B. Mayor's Appointment of Service Director

Mayor Sakacs noted Service Director Ron Strauser has announced he will be retiring November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2024. In order to ensure a smooth transition, he is appointing David Kroccheck as the new Service Director. This appointment will be effective December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024, and until then, Mr. Kroccheck will continue in his role as Assistant Service Director. This week the Assistant Service Director position will be posted internally to allow current employees to be considered for the position. The goal is to have both positions in place by December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024.

C. Amend OR 2024-50

Councilperson Bala stated he wanted to offer his opinion on this topic and is hopeful it can be changed. He noted one of the biggest complaints over the past decade in Wickliffe has been Euclid Avenue and its empty buildings. He noted Council has run for election/re-election letting residents know they are trying to fill vacant buildings on Euclid Avenue. He stated it seems some Council members are against recreational [marijuana] dispensaries after Wickliffe passed the legalization of it. He believes that it is wrong as it is not representing the residents. He noted dispensaries are safe places. They bring jobs, fill buildings, clean up properties, bring people into the City, and brings in about \$200,000.00 per year. This could be two police officers, two firemen, a bunch of city workers, or the re-doing of a street. He noted we need to look beyond Lubrizol and get tax dollars where we can, noting nothing drops in price. He noted Council looked at internet gambling approximately a year ago. We [Council] were worried about the look it would bring, but about sixty percent of residents don't even know that we have them. He noted [marijuana] is a legal product that can be sold like alcohol or cigarettes that is sold on almost every corner in the City. He stated gambling was illegal a few years ago, and now Ohio is one of the top gambling states. He noted in a few weeks, if this does not pass, he would like to look at not charging some of the vacant building fees for a year or two since we denied them a chance to be a legal business in the City. He noted he thought we were a business-friendly community; and stated that in five years this will not be a conversation as it will be so widely accepted/used. He suggested we be ahead of the game and not let other cities profit from a legal business; rather let Wickliffe profit from it. He noted he travels a lot, and he noticed the legal dispensaries are all over. He noted it is the future, and although some do not agree with it, but it brings money and other things to the City. He feels the ordinance should be amended to two dispensaries.

Council President Levon asked Police Chief Bush for clarification that the once incident [mentioned at an earlier meeting] at the Botanist was since the dispensary opened or since they started selling recreational [marijuana]. The Police Chief noted it was since they opened (back in 2018 or so), he added there have been others, but just a few. He noted they do not have problems there. Mr. Levon noted he wasn't sure when the incident(s) had occurred.

Mr. Bala noted if we do not act on this as soon as possible, we won't get it, as other places will take the business. He feels it is a big mistake. Mr. Levon noted we don't know what the State's rules will be yet. Mr. Bala noted we have [the ordinance] on first reading to only have one [dispensary], and wanted to know why it couldn't be two to be ahead of the game. Mr. Levon noted we could ask.

Mayor Sakacs stated his suggestion would be to allow the second in a different part of the City – not on Euclid Avenue – in possibly a light industrial zone. He mentioned he discussed this with Councilperson Thielman previously. He stated he and the Building Commissioner continue to get calls from people who want to come here for that. He understands it may be taboo or some may oppose it morally, but at the end

of the day we are not here to parent or for morals, we are here to provide business growth to this community. He is not suggesting fifteen, but does not believe two would harm the City.

Councilperson Salotto noted she agrees. She thinks it has become a very acceptable thing today whether we agree with it or not. She stated the one in the City is a great business, good looking, and they pay taxes, and are law-abiding. She is wondering why we would limit it to just one, since we have Wickliffe residents interested in opening [a dispensary]. She thinks we need to think about more than one. She believes it offers a regulated, safe place for people to buy [marijuana]. She also does not think it would be a bad thing. She thinks one is too little and maybe two is the right number. She suggested talking about it more in committee because we weren't all there and able to discuss it or talk about it with the citizens.

Mr. Levon noted he is not fully confident this will pass with one [dispensary]. His suggestion is to pass it with one, then revisit later to modify if necessary. He would like to see it pass as he believes it offers health benefits, he believes it's profitable, and doesn't think it's a something that is a blight on the City at all. He suggests that it remain as it is then potentially amend it down the road.

Mr. Bala wondered how long we would wait to make it two to stay ahead of the game. Mr. Levon noted if we amend it to two, then it gets voted down, then we have to start all over just like we did with the entertainment device arcades. His thought was to make the one we have official, then let people see that it is good and not bad and then we may have more additional direction from the State. He would also like to avoid the "mad rush" of multiple people wanting to have one and not being able to allow more than one in an area. He noted the State still has not issued its regulations regarding adult use sales.

Councilperson Gerhardstein stated he will vote yes on one, but no on two. He noted Councilperson Thielman was adamant on wanting zero. He noted Councilpersons Bala and Salotto were not at the Committee Meeting to hear the discussion. He noted he was convinced to vote for one, but if it goes any higher than one, he will vote no. Mr. Levon noted he is still unsure the majority will approve one, so that is why it is starting with one.

Mr. Bala noted it is hard to believe it is a legal product and we are not letting them into our city to sell it, and when the residents, sixty percent, voted to legalize it. Mr. Gerhardstein noted that is exactly why he will vote for one; he was the one to bring up the statistics at the committee meeting that the residents of the City of Wickliffe approved the legalization with over one thousand votes. Mr. Bala asked Mr. Gerhardstein, "Why no two?" and Mr. Gerhardstein responded, "Because I was going to vote for none, until I pulled the votes of the residents and they want it legal so I am going to vote for one."

Councilperson Koski noted it was unfortunate not everyone was able to or chose not to attend the committee meeting. She noted she thought there would have been notes for everyone to read. Mr. Levon noted there were two pages of minutes that were read [at the last Council Meeting], and the people who didn't make it were out of town for work. The minutes posted included the emails from those who were not able to attend. Ms. Salotto noted they [the emails] were not read. Mr. Levon noted he was not permitted to read them, but they were posted with the minutes.

Mr. Levon believes we should make sure the Botanist gets in and is all good, and he is not confident there will be four votes to approve the one based on the committee meeting. Councilperson Thielman wished to clarify, as the minutes [of the committee meeting] stated he was against. He noted he is okay with the one, because they are legally here as a medical use facility and by luck they get an adult use permit. We did not ban the sale of adult use marijuana, so he feels it is unfair to go backwards and not allow the sale of adult use product. That is why he is okay with the status quo. He also mentioned he spoke with the Mayor about adult use medical marijuana in other zoning districts, similar to the one in Painesville which is in an industrial area – not on the main drag. Plenty of people go to it and can find it; it's just not on the main drag where you are trying to turn it into something better. He stated as this is presented, he plans to vote yes on the current ordinance. He also asked if one, why not two, why not five, why not ten, noting we don't even know what the rules will be yet, since [the State] has not yet determined how licenses will be awarded. He is aware of at least two groups [here] looking to get the first license, but we do not know the rules surrounding these licenses.

Mayor Sakacs noted this is apples to apples – alcohol was illegal, alcohol is legal. He stated he is trying not to get emotional. Things have happened to people he knows and their family members as a result of [alcohol] and we have fifteen or more places one can purchase and consume alcohol. He noted he is all for business and he supports them as much as he can but he is not understanding. It is legal in the State and the Wickliffe voters passed it, and he does not understand the limit. He stated one could purchase alcohol anywhere, lottery tickets, gambling, cigarettes, anywhere in this city, but when it comes to weed we are going to handcuff it. Maybe it is because it was drugs; he just does not understand; it just bothers him. Mr. Gerhardstein stated everyone can have their own opinion. The Mayor noted we are not here to parent,

and Mr. Gerhardstein repeated that he is allowed to have his own opinion.

Councilperson Jaworski asked the Mayor to clarify what he stated earlier regarding a commercial manufacturing or industrial sector. He noted it is his understanding that, according to our current zoning code we cannot allow retail into those areas, but he will defer to the Law Director. Mr. Iosue noted we would have to make an adjustment because it is considered a retail establishment. Mr. Jaworski noted this gets into spot zoning which has been discussed in the Planning Commission many times. Mr. Iosue acknowledged there are a lot of "moving parts" to that. He added because the State law allows for designation of certain numbers and places, it might allow for that, but it would require doing some potential changes in addition to this ordinance.

Mr. Levon asked if there were any further comments, and here was no response.

The time will be communicated, as it was unclear since it had been adjusted a few times.


